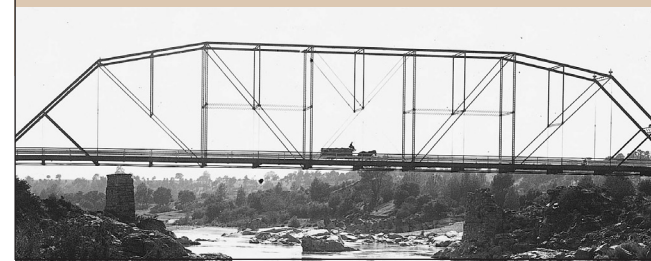
HPL's board of directors meets at 4 p.m. the second Wednesday of each month at the Folsom History Museum, 823 Sutter St., Folsom.

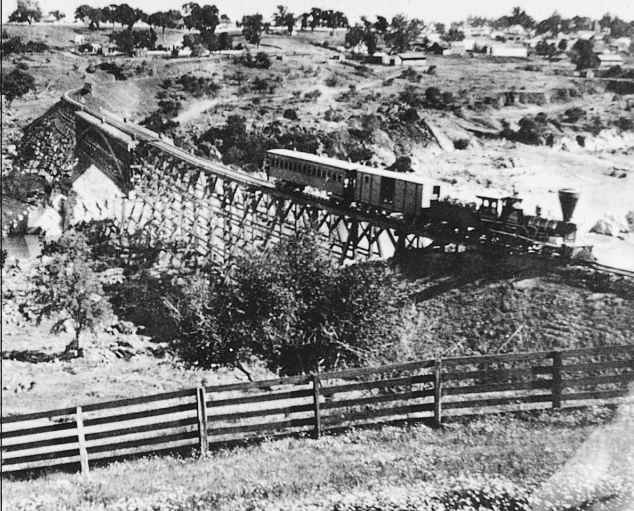

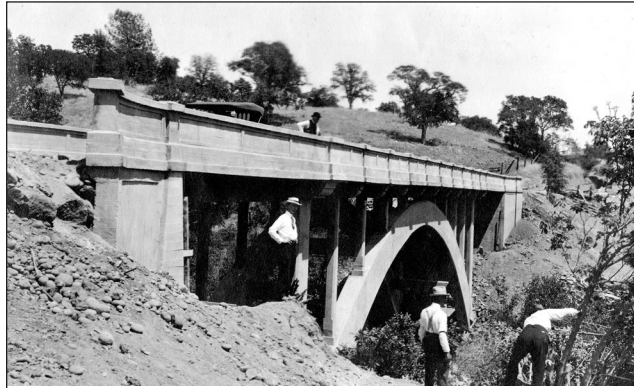
## About HPL

The Heritage Preservation League of Folsom is a grassroots watchdog group established in 2003 to preserve Folsom's rich heritage. Our mission is to identify, protect and interpret Folsom's historic sites and structures.



## What we do

HPL monitors state, local and private-sector activities that relate to Folsom's historic sites and structures, and we advocate to ensure these activities do not have a negative impact on Folsom's heritage. We also support preservation projects such as the Chan House restoration.



## Our goals

## Our successes

HPL involvement in historic preservation projects and issues has:

- saved the Orangevale Avenue Bridge, built in 1915 and once on the Lincoln Highway, from demolition (at left)
- supported the revitalization of Folsom's Historic District
- delayed construction of a hotel next to Chinese diggings, preserving the diggings
- prevented a five-story condo from being built in the parking lot next to the historic Nimbus Winery
- supported the Lake Natoma Trail in Historic Folsom
- worked to preserve historic railroad right of way for future excursions to El Dorado County
